ADAT SHALOM IS PROUD TO WELCOME LEONARD SLATKIN, as our guest speaker at the next SYNERGY Shabbat Dinner on Friday evening, November 20.

The internationally renowned conductor began his 2nd season this fall as Music Director of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.

Throughout the world, Mr. Slatkin's performances have been distinguished by imaginative programming and highly praised interpretations of the standard and contemporary symphonic repertoire. He is also well-known for his advocacy work on behalf of music education.

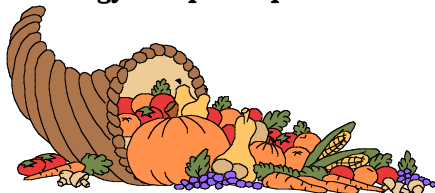
Following a successful tenure as Music Director of the Saint Louis Symphony from 1979 to 1996, Mr. Slatkin became Conductor Laureate. He has served as Festival Director of the Cleveland Orchestra's Blossom Festival, Principal Guest Conductor of the Philharmonia Orchestra, Chief Conductor of the BBC Symphony Orchestra, and Principal Guest Conductor of the Los Angeles Philharmonic at the Hollywood Bowl. He has appeared with virtually every major international orchestra.

CANTOR VIEDER ה"ר

These are the remarks which I shared at the unveiling of Cantor Vieder's ה"ר monument at the Adat Shalom Memorial Park on 9 Tishri 5770 September 27, 2009 at 10 a.m.

Those of us who knew him dearly loved him

Ohr Zahrua L'tzadik U'lyishreh Lev Simchah - "Light is Sown for the Righteous and Joy for the Upright in Heart" is the verse that the Vieder family chose to be inscribed on Cantor Vieder's monument and to be a focus of my remarks for this occasion. We will hear these words chanted again tonight when the Torah Scrolls are taken from the Ark and processed in the congregation.



RABBI YOSKOWITZ

When Cantor Vieder said these words, he was greeting people, singing and davening, all of which typified his life. This verse applies to our Cantor Vieder not because of how he chanted it but because the words described him. He was a light in our lives and a *tzadik*, a righteous man.

During the week or on Sunday, when he heard that a member was hospitalized, he would visit. He raised money quietly and without seeking recognition. He was warm, gentle, authentic.

Tonight as the Torahs are processed, think of Cantor Vieder as I will. Think of his smile as he greeted you; think of his devotion as he led us in prayer; think of how his presence filled the sanctuary.

In his book, *Holy Living: Saints and Saintliness in Judaism*, Rabbi Louis Jacobs, a Conservative theologian, wrote that "the hasid is a man who is not content with the normal standards of observance, but who resolves to go *Lifnim M'shurat Hadin*- far beyond the letter of the law. What an apt way of describing Cantor Vieder! He gave of himself and inspired others to

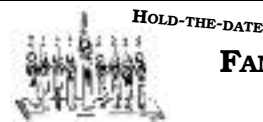


VETERAN'S SHABBAT FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 6 5 PM AT ADAT SHALOM

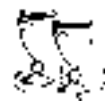

FROM THE PRESIDENT THOUGHTS FOR THE MONTH

We enjoyed really terrific High Holiday services at Adat Shalom this year. *Yasher Kochechem* to Rabbis Bergman and Shere for their leadership of the services, to Hazzan Gross and the Mixed Choir, Mark Vieder and the Men's Choir, and to everyone else who participated in our services. FROM RABBI BERGMAN HONORING OUR VETERANS

November 11th of each year is Veterans Day, a day all Americans should hold close in their hearts. The date was chosen because it represents the time the Armistice Agreement was signed that effectively ended World War I, then known as the "War to end all wars."

The freedoms in our country that we enjoy today, and maybe take for granted, are in large part due to the incredible heroism and devotion of the men and women who felt a profound sense of duty. Some may have volunteered, while others were drafted. It does not matter. They served their country and deserve our gratitude. Unfortunately, they are often forgotten when their service is done.

It is one of the shames of our country that so many veterans are homeless or at least without adequate medical care and nutrition. The number of disabled vets is increasing daily. Even if they get benefits, it may take months to arrive. We need to contact our Congressional leaders to make sure our government provides better for all these men and women and their families.

On November 6th, we will be honoring members of the Jewish War Veterans at our Friday night service. They will be joined by our Scout Troop. The Jewish War Veterans is the oldest veterans group in America. JWV began in 1896 by aging veterans of the Civil War who wanted to remind the world of the horrors of the war at a time that it was becoming romanticized. They expanded over the years to include veterans of all wars. They even made Theodore Roosevelt an honorary Jewish War Veteran, an honor he accepted with pride.

The Jewish War Veterans have been in the forefront of working on behalf of veterans who have had hard times. They have protested on behalf of Soviet Jewry and the State of Israel. I am proud to have them honor us with their presence and look forward to further connections.

FROM HAZZAN GROSS WHAT'S IN A NAME?

If I'm not mistaken, a question that's been circulating since my arrival at Adat Shalom is, "What's with this *Hazzan* thing?" Please allow me to explain.

There is one major difference between the two words Cantor and Hazzan. The simple distinction is that the former word is in English and the latter is in Hebrew. The word Cantor is Latin for singer, actor, or poet. From this etymology we derive such words as chant and canticle. The Latin stem "canto," aside from meaning to sing or to play, also means to predict. The word Hazzan comes from the Hebrew root *chazah*. *Chazah* means all of the following: to look at, to watch, to foresee, to predict, to anticipate, and to prophesy.

There are various schools of thought as to how the title Hazzan became affixed to the position. One explanation is that for a long time *siddurim* (prayer books) were not a part of the prayer experience. Either everybody knew all of the prayers from memory or one person chanted the prayers on everyone else's behalf. The person who chanted these prayers was entitled the Hazzan because he was the only one who could "see" (i.e. *chazah*) the sole prayer book. If you take the same three root letters (*chet, zayin, heh*) and add the vowel *cholam malei* (a *vav* with a dot over it), you get the word *chazon*. *Chazon* means "visionary." This latter interpretation is for me the most meaningful description of why I do what I do.

Two thousand years ago, it was not uncommon for the word Hazzan to be synonymous with prophet. It is a serendipitous coincidence that the two words Hazzan and Cantor have

FROM RABBI SHERE THE LORD IS ONE

Ever since I can remember, I have said six simple words before falling asleep at night: "*Shema Yisrael Adonai Eloheinu Adonai Echad.*" These words are often translated as, "Here O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is one." It seems like a pretty simple concept: God is one. However, over the years, as I've studied the prayer's meaning, I have come to understand it differently.

I believe it is not, as some might read it, a statement that God is one, as opposed to two or three. Rather, I believe it is a statement about the "Oneness" and interconnectedness of all life. We all come from God and we will all return to God; in the middle, however, we each walk this earth carrying a piece of God's presence within us. This piece, the soul, connects us both to each other and to God.

One of the reasons for covering our eyes when we say the *Shema* is so that we can imagine this interconnectedness, this Oneness of all life. With our eyes open, we see boundaries, edges and distinctions; we see concrete definitions of "me" and "you." With our eyes covered,

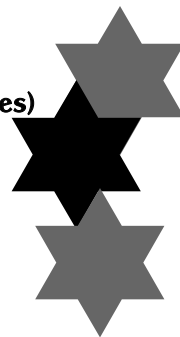

DURING THIS YEAR we have transferred a number of our family programs to the classroom. Children love to learn with their parents. We are saving those experiences for a few very special programs and hope that you will join us for these. • **Bar-Bat Mitzvah Connections: A Family Adventure.** Our new Bar-Bat Mitzvah program presents two special mornings, *Tallit 'n Tefillin and Other Jewish Stuff*, facilitated by Hazzan Gross on November 8 and *Jewish Roots*, facilitated by Elissa Berg and Debi Banooni on November 22. *Tallit 'n Tefillin* is appropriate for students who are 13-24 months before their Bar-Bat Mitzvah date. *Jewish Roots* is designed for students who are 4-12 months before their celebration. Invitations have been sent to all eligible families.

• **As part of the curriculum of caring for the larger community**, our fifth graders will be visiting area senior facilities. Each class will go once in November and once in January. Visiting each facility twice will give the children and the seniors the chance to connect. On Sunday, November 22, our fifth graders will present the stories they have written about someone in their family who is a mitzvah hero. Next month they will make special Tzedakah boxes to take home so that they can continue the wonderful habits of *tzedakah* and *chesed* that they have been practicing. As part of the *Artists in the School program* (funded by the Derooy Testamentary Foundation) the fifth graders will also be creating a tzedakah cabinet, a piece of furniture that will have different spaces to collect funds for different causes and drawers or shelves for the donation of items. This tzedakah cabinet will then travel to many of our programs (with a fifth grader to explain it) so other students will have the opportunity to see it, learn from it and donate.

prophetic connotations. Are Hazzanim modern day prophets? I think not. They are, however, visionaries for our religious experience. I aspire to be a facilitator and an innovator of prayer, of music, and of one's overall spiritual experience. A Hazzan needs to balance the old with the new. It is my responsibility to respect the tradition by keeping it intact and alive, while at the same time bringing it new life by embracing innovation. It is my hope that my chanting transcends the ordinary concept of a "pleasing melody" and allows your prayer experience to deepen and become more meaningful.

While Cantor and Hazzan are merely titles, in my opinion Hazzan is such a more beautiful word. You may be thinking to yourself, I can't even pronounce it! Hazzan is pronounced *cha-ZAN*, with the stress on the second syllable. For some, it is natural to say *CHA-zn* with the stress on the first syllable, which is the Yiddish pronunciation. I've been introducing myself to the children of our community as "Hazz'n Dan."

Is it okay to call me Cantor? Of course! It is merely a matter of preference and I hope after this brief explanation I've shed some light on this matter for you – as your Hazzan.

Vieder! He gave of himself and inspired others to give. He not only loved to study Jewish texts, but practiced what he studied. During Yom Kippur, he not only cried out to God, but moved us to do the same.

Cantor Vieder, as a survivor, knew that on Yom Kippur people needed to cry. In the Yom Kippur prayer *Sh'ma Kolenu*, he prayed from his heart and could cry even as he inspired others to express deep feelings through tears. He had the insight of the Kotzker Rebbe who taught "When a person needs to cry but cannot cry - that is the most heart-rending cry of all." (See Rabbi Norman Lamm's "Three Who Cried," a Rosh Hashanah Sermon, September 29, 1962).

He always gave that extra measure as a friend, as a hazzan, as a teacher, as a colleague, but most of all he gave that extra measure to his beloved Gitta, to his children, to his grandchildren - to his great-grandchildren who loved their *zeyde*. It was family and Judaism that were the essences of his life.

He was what a Rabbi or Cantor ought to be: *an Eved Hashem V'ohav Habriyot* - a worker for God and a lover of man.

Tonight as you hear "Or Zarua" join with me in smiling at the memory of Cantor Vieder singing this verse. Close your eyes and picture him leading us in prayer. As we unveil this monument in his name, let us all remember him and remember how he was a light in our lives. *Yehi Zichro Baruch* - the memory of him will be a blessing.

however, we "see" that separateness is an illusion, that we are all part of something greater. One of my favorite writers, Anne Lamott, puts it this way: "Though there is only one of each of us, we are all mosaic chips of The One." The *Shema* reminds us that we are never alone.
