TWO JEWISH WEDDING RITUALS

MY APRIL VOICE COLUMN offered some explanation of the Jewish rituals surrounding mourning and the shiva house. After reading the article, some of you requested a similar article explaining the meanings behind certain wedding rituals.

In a traditional Jewish wedding, the couple begins the wedding by circling one another seven times. This circling is reminiscent of when our people first entered the Promised Land. At that time, the city of Jericho was fortified by strong walls which God told the people to circle seven times. After doing so, the walls crumbled and they were able to enter the land of Israel. Similarly, as the wedding couple walk around each other, they melt away any physical, spiritual or emotional walls that might have existed between them. In this ritual, marriage is likened to the Promised Land and the couple's circling of each other proclaims their commitment to healthy communication and a life together without walls.

To end the ceremony, they break a glass. At this most joyful moment in the couple's life, the broken glass reminds them that, despite their personal happiness, the world in which we live is still very broken. While marriage is partially about gazing at one's beloved and bringing happiness to each other, it is also about looking out into the world together and, as a team, working to make it better. The Jewish wedding ceremony concludes with this dramatic "send off" to remind the couple – and everyone present – of our true task in life, *tikkun olam*, repairing our world.

KABBALAT SHABBAT: A WEEKLY WEDDING

THE PERSONIFICATION OF GOD is not a foreign concept in Judaism. There are countless names of God, and many of them are anthropomorphic in nature. In prayer, we frequently refer to God as King, Father, Lord and Master. Shabbat is similarly personified, often being referred to as Shabbat HaMalkah, the Sabbath Queen.

Shabbat has become associated with several symbols that come in pairs: 2 challot, 2 candlesticks, 2 services on Shabbat morning (Shacharit and Musaf), and the *neshama yeteira* (the "additional soul" which the Talmud teaches that every person receives on Shabbat). Therefore, it seems ironic that there exists a tale of the lonely Shabbat. Legend has it that Shabbat lamented to God that every other day of the week had a partner – Sunday & Monday, Tuesday & Wednesday, Thursday & Friday – yet only Shabbat remained alone. Upon hearing this plea, God bestowed upon Shabbat the perfect partner – the Jewish people.

From this poignant tale emerges the analogy of the Friday night Kabbalat Shabbat service to a wedding, with Shabbat as the bride and the Jewish people as the groom. Thus, the hallmark of the Friday night service is the singing of *L'cha Dodi Likrat Kallah*, which may be translated as "Come my beloved, let us welcome the bride." Toward the end of *L'cha Dodi*, we rise as one and turn to face the entrance of the room to welcome our Shabbat bride.

A wedding is one of the most joyous times in one's life. We are fortunate as Jews to celebrate Kabbalat Shabbat, this beautiful wedding of Shabbat and the Jewish people, each and every Friday night. At Adat Shalom, our hour-long service is infused with beautiful, upbeat and heartwarming congregational melodies. I encourage you to come experience Kabbalat Shabbat at Adat!

AS WE APPROACH SHAVUOT...

THERE IS A TRADITION in Jewish mysticism that Adam and Eve, the first two humans, shared a single soul. That soul would be the only one there would ever be. Adam and Eve were to be immortal and remain the only two people on Earth. They were never to leave the Garden of Eden.

As we all know, that is not how it worked out. They were expelled from Eden, but not because they ate the forbidden fruit. Rather, it was because of how they treated each other when God confronted them with what they had done. Adam blames Eve for tempting him. Eve blames the serpent. The two of them turn on each other, and refuse to take any responsibility for their actions.

This hostility leads to a shattering of their unified soul into many souls, and a loss of their immortality. Each piece of that shattered soul becomes part of the soul of each person to be born.

This is not just a story of loss, nor is it one of despair. If we look at it correctly, we can see it as a challenge for us. The purpose of humanity is to reunite those broken aspects of the original soul.

I am discussing this now, and not in the fall when we read the book of Genesis, because a key to understanding this story is Shavuot, the holiday of the giving of the Torah, which we will soon celebrate.

God did not give the Torah to the Jewish people. God turned a group of former slaves of every ethnicity, language and culture into the Jewish people. Some of the freed slaves were likely descendants of the original Children of Jacob/Israel who entered Egypt hundreds of years before, but many were slaves from other countries who found the story of the God of Jacob, a God concerned about all of humanity, so compelling.

God took these broken souls and brought them to healing and wholeness through the Torah. It is important to note that this does not mean one mind, or one heart. When the Torah says to love God with all your heart, the word is in the singular. Each person has to find his or her own way.

A single soul means that we are all deeply connected to each other in an emotional way and that we take responsibility for our actions toward others and ourselves.

This is not just about the Jewish people. We are to be a model for all people, to show that God wants all the descendants of Adam and Eve to feel connected to each other, to realize that all human beings share a single soul. What hurts someone else hurts us even when we do not feel it at the moment. What brings joy to others nourishes our souls when we allow ourselves to feel it.

As we approach Shavuot let us each find one way to reunite our soul with another. It can be as simple as a kind gesture to a stranger, or as difficult as reconciling with someone who has hurt us. Together we can make another Eden.

That's what Tikkun Adat meal makers often report after visiting a recipient's home.

But the mitzvah goes both ways. One volunteer commented after her recent Erev Shabbat delivery: "It's such a priceless gift to create and deliver a meal. I was once a recipient, and now I have the privilege of giving back."

Nu, so how is a meal arranged? Confidentiality is paramount. Usually, first responders are our clergy. After visiting ill or bereaved members, they will pass on meal requests to the Tikkun Adat Committee.

Every meal maker has her own specialties, but the fare is always tailored to the needs – including kashrut and diet requirements – of the recipients.

WITH SUMMER FINALLY HERE, it's time to put on some gardening gloves and come to Adat Shalom to help tend our **Mitzvah and Mishnah Garden**. What is a Mitzvah and Mishnah Garden, you ask? Thanks to the Hermelin Davidson Fund for Congregational School Excellence, we were able to acquire a grant to install four garden beds with greenhouses adjacent to our playground.

This summer we are growing our first batch of herbs and vegetables, which we started indoors on Family Volunteer Day in March. We'll have already made sure to plant our herbs and vegetables according to the laws of *kilayim* (these laws about mixtures tell us which plants cannot be planted next to one another), but we have so much more to do. We have had a lot of help setting up our garden from Paul Goldsmith, David Strauss, and Tamar Dvir – but there is just so much more to do, and every single person can make a difference.

OVER THE SUMMER, we will be doing the bulk of the gardening, which includes both weeding and harvesting our produce.



We also aim to bring a fresh delivery of food to Yad Ezra periodically throughout the summer, fulfilling the mitzvah of feeding the poor. We can't literally leave the corners of our field unharvested, as the Torah instructs us to do, but we can bring a percentage of our crops to a food bank. We will

also have a Yad Ezra donation bin downstairs near the education office all summer, so when we deliver fresh produce, we can take non-perishable goods as well.

WHEN CAN YOU HELP OUT?

- FAMILY GARDENING DAYS -

Families of all ages are invited to come learn a little about the different Jewish aspects of gardening (Mishnah) and tend the garden (mitzvah) once a month throughout the summer: June 8,

July 13, and August 17. Meet on the playground at 10 a.m. and bring gardening gloves, hats, and water. If there is something ready to harvest, you'll get a taste and take some home as well. We are growing two kinds of tomatoes, cucumbers, garden beans, squash, peas, and several kinds of herbs. All of the plants were started from organic seeds.

- WEEKLY GARDENING -

We are looking for volunteers to come tend the garden several times a week during the day. Bring a friend or family member, or enjoy the solitary meditative experience that gardening gives. 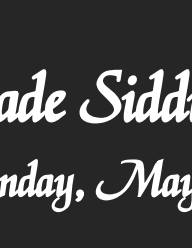

THE TRIENNIAL SYSTEM AND ALIYOT...

As you know by now from Rabbi Bergman's letter to the congregation, we will be adopting the triennial Torah cycle beginning June 7th. Using the triennial system means that the individual aliyot will be shorter, usually 3-5 verses. This will increase opportunities for our congregants to read Torah on Shabbat, because it will be easier to learn an aliyah. If you are interested in reading Torah this summer, please send me an email with dates you are available.

An important consequence of this change will be the manner in which we assign aliyot in the morning. Because the Torah reading will go much faster, we plan to assign all aliyot before we remove the scroll from the ark. Everyone who has been assigned an aliyah in advance, or hopes to receive an aliyah in the morning for a particular occasion, should check in with that week's gabbai (either Larry Buch or Paul Goldsmith) no later than 9:30 a.m. Also, because the shortened reading will remove the ability to add multiple additional aliyot as we go, I strongly encourage you to arrange in advance if you are requesting an aliyah for a special occasion. Otherwise, on Shabbat morning, available aliyot will be offered first to those with *yahrzeit* on Shabbat, followed by those with a *yahrzeit* for a parent during the coming week.

We also look for congregants to chant *Haftarah* during the summer. If you would like to chant *Haftarah* on the anniversary of your bar/bat mitzvah or in conjunction with observing a *yahrzeit* or celebrating a special occasion, please let me know the date you would be interested in receiving this honor. Anyone who is chanting *Haftarah* is encouraged and welcome to read the *maftir* Torah reading as well when called up to the Torah.

PLEASE HELP US...

I am in the process of compiling a list of our congregants' bar/bat mitzvah *parshiyot* and *Haftarot*. This information will help us offer aliyot or the opportunity to chant Torah or *Haftarah* on the anniversaries of these occasions. Please add this information to the signup sheet in the chapel when you are at the synagogue, or send me an email with the information. If you do not remember the name of your *parasha*/*Haftarah*, simply provide the date of your bar/bat mitzvah.

Also, please remember to fill out one of our minyan cards (in the gray box outside the chapel) to update the information we have on file. On the back, there's a place to list the *yahrzeit* information you would like us to announce each year.

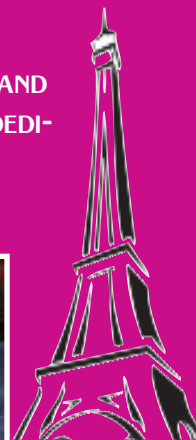
